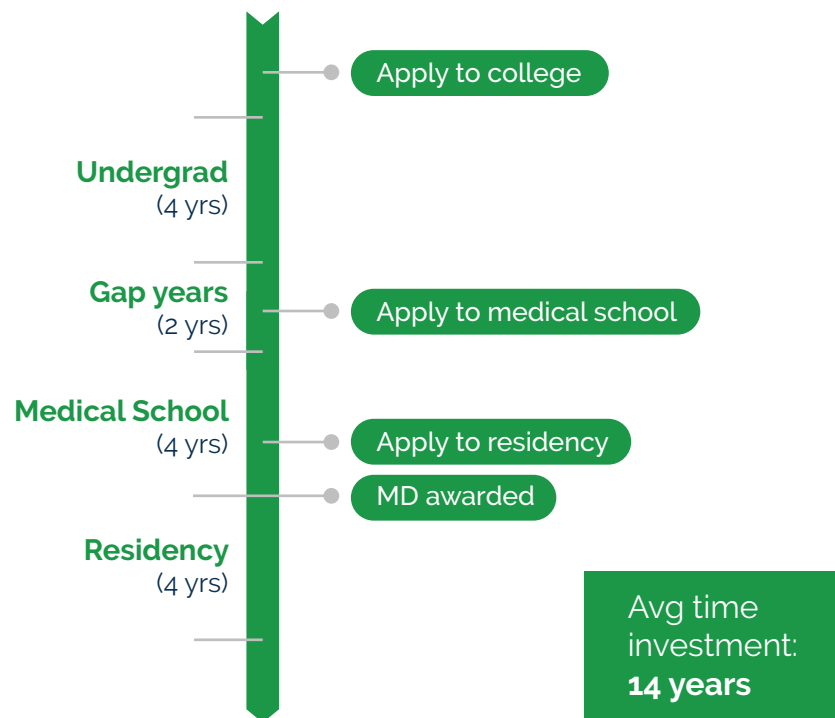

Explore Your Options: Two Routes to a White Coat

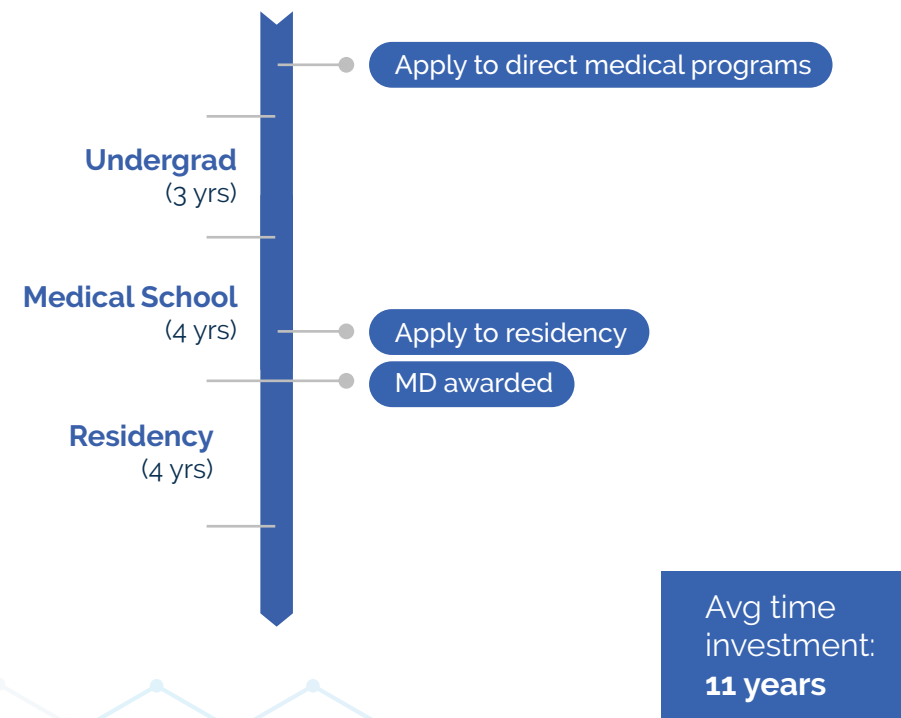
Route #1: Traditional Path

The traditional way to become a doctor is to apply to college, complete an undergraduate degree, and then apply to medical school.



Route #2: Direct Medical Program

Some schools offer direct medical programs (a.k.a. BS/MD or BA/MD programs), which combine the process of earning an undergrad and medical degree by accepting high school seniors to both college and medical school.



Weigh the Differences:

Traditional Path vs. Direct Medical



Time/Cost

Advantage: Direct Medical

Direct medical programs are faster, and therefore cheaper, than the traditional pathway. Direct medical students face 7-8 years of higher education/living costs versus 8-10 years for traditional students.



Prestige

Advantage: Traditional

Most applicants who are competitive for direct medical admissions are qualified to attend prestigious universities. Those who decide to attend a direct medical program usually do so at the expense of earning more prestigious credentials as a traditional student.



Stress

Advantage: Direct Medical

While traditional pre-meds must fight for top grades and extracurriculars to be competitive for medical school admissions, direct medical students have a guaranteed spot in medical school, as long as they meet GPA and/or MCAT requirements.



Flexibility

Advantage: Traditional

Traditional pre-meds are free to switch career paths and apply to whatever medical school they wish. Direct medical students who do the same will have to transfer credits to a different program, or if they drop out to apply elsewhere for medical school, they may face questions about their commitment.



Competition

Advantage: Traditional

Even the most selective undergraduate programs are easier to get into than the typical direct medical program. For instance, in 2023, 5% of applicants were admitted to Brown University's undergraduate class, but only 2.5% were admitted to PLME, Brown's direct medical program.



Community

Advantage: Traditional

As a direct medical student, you'll join a tight-knit community with a common purpose. However, your group of peers will be small: only 3% of current medical students are part of a direct medical program. Traditional students, on the other hand, will be surrounded by those who followed a similar path.

Choose a Path That's Right for You

Direct Medical Programs (BS/MD or BA/MD)

A direct medical program could be right for you if you have:

- Stellar grades (GPA > 3.7)
- Elite test scores (SAT >1400, ACT >32)
- Outstanding extracurriculars (volunteering, research, etc.)
- Demonstrated interest in medicine (e.g. physician shadowing)
- A burning desire to become a doctor

Timeline of Work

Now that we've had our initial meeting and are getting our work together really underway, I thought it'd be helpful for you to have this timeline. It's pretty much the "broad-strokes", but I hope it provides enough of a grounding for you to anticipate the scope of the work you've got over the next few months.

We can talk through any questions you have during our next chat, or feel free to text me anytime:

LOOSE TIMELINE FOR OUR WORK TOGETHER
Now-August

1) This is prime essay writing time. We'll work on both your Common App essays (including any Supplemental Essays the schools you're applying to might require) as well as your Why MD essay. I think you've got the bandwidth to handle both the Common App and Why MD simultaneously, so we'll proceed in that direction unless you feel otherwise. Please let us know so we don't ask too much of you when you've already got other stuff going on.

2) Also during this time we'll add to and begin whittling down your school list based on our conversations and your impression of places based upon your research. Both traditional undergrad school and BSMD programs will be included in the same GoogleSheet doc so that you can have a centralized place for your research. That's accessible via the College School List on CHART. I'll be adding some schools to your list over the next couple days--feel free to check out their sites whenever you get a spare minute or two.

2a) As you're researching schools, it would be a good idea to look into their interview policies and to sign up for one if/whenever they begin offering them again. There will be fields on your School List spreadsheet for you to keep track of these sorts of details, just FYI.

2b) It will also be important to look into any Supplemental Materials that a school might ask for. An example would be Brown's short video they let applicants submit. Resumes, optional supplements (like arts supplements, music supplements, etc.) are all things you should look for when researching schools. All this info tends to be readily available via schools' respective Admission websites.

3) If you haven't already, we'll also begin identifying your preferred recommenders. Reaching out now is OK if you're super cool with your recommenders, but it'd be ideal to hang back and not ask much more than "would you be willing" at this point. We can talk later about any other steps you may/may not want to take to help them write the best letter they can on your behalf.

NOTES, 4/30

1) We talked about applying to Johns Hopkins ED to get you your best shot at admission. I think that's a great plan so long as you're 100% sure that's the place for you!


2) We talked a little about the proportions of your school list--we settled on a rough split of about 75% BS/MD/DO programs (the actual split within THAT group TBD with Dr. Dallara's input) and 25% traditional undergraduate programs.

3) RE: recommendations, you mentioned that you have asked and are set to ask your teachers by the end of this week. At this point, just get a "yes" and then we'll follow up with a nice email thanking them later.

4) We talked about you sitting in on any college visits you may be interested in. In previous years, the super selective schools (say, places with <25% acceptance rates) didn't tend to pay too much attention to demonstrated interest (DI) because they didn't have to. Less-selective institutions use DI to guess your likelihood of enrollment were you admitted and/or offered aid of some sort. This year, with everything being different, things MAY have changed a bit, but my guess is not by a whole lot. Nevertheless, attending sessions is a good idea so long as they don't interfere with anything else important you've got going on. We'll err on the side of caution this year.

great work getting the common app draft out on paper!

There are two places I'd like you to drill down on, and write as standalone pieces essays/thoughts about:

- 1) Culture as a source of lacking self-confidence. What's up with that? Where'd it come from? When did you notice it and actually have a name for it, so to speak? Most importantly, reflect in your writing all of the above as they were happening--try to put us inside your head to let us know how you processed it.
- 2) Abilities--talk about your trajectory as a student. How you went from where you were to how you are now. What factors contributed to you being your former self, and you being your current self? What internal factors contributed to your growth?

Normally, on my bike, I can slip away from reality, venturing into a world of my own making. But today, the door to my imagination is locked. All I can think about is my karate training. My usual approach just didn't seem to resonate with me. My fear was palpable, so much so that it stuck with me the entire next day.

As a seasoned karate instructor, I always start the class by stressing the importance of confidence and mental strength. But my philosophy just didn't seem to resonate with one of my students. His fear was palpable, so much so that his fear stuck with me even during the entire next day. Thus, I did what I always do when I need to find solutions: hop on my bike.

Truthfully, the training session stuck with me because it was so familiar. Once upon a time, I was the most self-conscious and scared 10-year-old, who struggled with even asking simple questions. I never wanted to speak up. Ironically, my parents enrolled me in karate, hoping that it would empower me.

On my first day of class, stepping on the cool mat, with floor to ceiling mirrors and lights illuminating my every move and floor-to-ceiling mirrors, there was no escaping. After kicking with the wrong leg and punching in the wrong direction, I started to feel even more defeated. Thankfully, one of the instructors approached me. I barely knew him, but something about his demeanor made me immediately trust him—I sensed he genuinely wanted to help me. Whether that be from his fearless attitude or positive mindset, this instructor became a part of my small circle of people who I trust. Over the next few months, because my mentor never gave up on me, I slowly became more and more confident. Maybe I was not as naturally talented at karate as some of my teammates, but I had learned that I had my own unique strengths and ways to contribute to the team. I grew comfortable in my own skin. I didn't just stop shying away from voicing my unique passions and perspectives—I became a leader, teacher, and advocate.

Growing up, I sought comfort in biking, in part, because I used to be so introverted. I've lost count of the number of times I hopped on my bike throughout my childhood because I felt like I had nowhere to turn. Ultimately, my lack of self-confidence stemmed from my perception



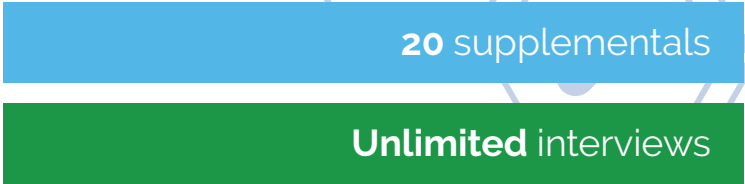

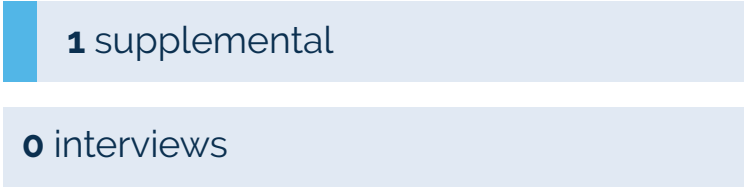
